

A newly imagined performance of the chilling story of Bluebeard, in the form of an opera. The music and the libretto in their turn have drawn from Susan Adams a sequence of images. Each page evokes the unfolding pathos of the events that the walls of Duke Bluebeard's castle have witnessed. The opera had its original premier on May 24, 1918, in Budapest and continues to be performed today.

This copy in a custom binding by Paul Delrue, done in 2014, who also has signed on the colophon page. Glenys Cour's richly powerful collage images help to make a journey through this large format book an extraordinary experience. For the special edition, within the book, on every image-page, the artist has

made additions by hand in gold which, as admirers of her paintings will know, is one of her trademarks along with the colour ultramarine, which also plays a key role in this production.

Like a Phoenix arising from ashes, the play Equus and, as a derivative, this work, arose out of a horrible crime committed by a 17-year old in England against six horses. As brutal as the

original act was, we can garner flashes of insight and, hopefully, wisdom through understanding the motivation behind the act.

The characters navigate the mental world in which such a deed could be comprehensible, but the center of the play is the relationship of the young man and his psychiatrist.

The special edition includes a separate suite of woodcuts, titled, numbered (1/10) and signed by Ralph Kiggell, in four colors, that complement but are different from the illustrations in the volume, and are printed on Japanese paper, with water-based inks and by hand. Both are encased in a custom clamshell box. The title comes from D.H. Lawrence's wonder at "the third thing" that binds an oxygen atom with two of hydrogen; along those lines, the poems selected are all picked around a theme of water.



which lasts for thirteen days, through January 6, which in the Christian world was celebrated as Epiphany. Some say Olaf takes a journey within himself, others that he travels outside, into the macrocosm of space and time.



A beautiful edition of Wordsworth's famous poem, made with love by natives of the poem's scenic landscape.





Per the artist, this work, originally produced by her in 1967, is "about a man who is killed by the plague in London in 1665; I have brought him to life again, so that he can tell his story." The story unfolds as a series of nine eerily wonderful etchings by Angela Lemaire, which were inspired by the sufferings of the plague victims. Each enclosed in a separate leaf and introduced with a quotation from scripture also dealing with suffering, with each plate numbered and signed by her.

A second opera-for-all by Benjamin Britten, written for the Pimlico School in London. The scenes included involve the Salutation — which introduces Gabriel, Mary and Joseph, Elizabeth and midwives who arrive for the birth; The Shepherds; the Magi; Herod and the Innocents and the knights who carry out the orders to kill. The language is wonderfully bucolic and designed to entertain in the rabble of medieval Chester and the surrounding towns.

Per Paul, each of the ten copies bound for the Old Stile Press were a little different, while the design was very much in keeping with the text.









The natural give-and-take of collaboration is all inspired by forms found in the natural world: poppies, fire, trees, water, rocks, landscapes and birds.

A charmingly distinctive style of calligraphy, faithfully rendered by way of photopolymer plates, together with a stunning piece of original calligraphy by Andy Moore, being an excerpt from Keats' "Endymion".

A stunning selection of work from this period, accompanying a beautifully illustrated bibliography.





The text of this volume was conceived in hospital during an extended treatment for cancer, where artist Rigby Graham (1931-2015) retreated into recollections of the past to escape the sterile detention of the infirmary; the overall structure of the book is built around that method of circumvention during a time of calamity.

The poems that artist Ralph Kiggell selected for this work move in chronological order, dating from the Han Dynasty to the Sung Dynasty, and were chosen for their muse-like quality, which appealed to the artist.





The only book published by English author and war poet Arthur Graeme West (1891-1917). Being the grim journey of a young Balliol scholar who enthusiastically enlists in the army in 1914, who becomes quickly disillusioned when faced with the horrors of war, eventually losing his faith in both the army and God. Welsh artist John Abell's illustrations for this book evoke the overwhelming, gruesome

Printer/Publisher Nicolas McDowall cherry-picked a few choice poems from the larger work, which served as inspiration to artist Harry Brockway.









Powys Mathers in 1919; it became some of the most iconic love poetry of the twentieth-century. Welsh artist Glenys Cour (b. 1924) uses collage to build her striking images of black and white papers, textured with monotype stippling. A stunningly romantic presentation of these beautiful verses.

"The Ballad of Reading Gaol" is a poem written by Oscar Wilde (1854-1900) in exile in Berneval-le-Grand, after his release from Reading Gaol on 19 May 1897, where he had been imprisoned for "homosexual offenses" (at that time, a crime). The poem describes the execution of fellow prisoner Charles Thomas Wooldridge as a means of symbolically identifying with the prisoners as a whole, highlighting the brutality of imprisonment.
